There was a penny table with a great selection of prizes, as well as an additional raffle and yes, the always popular cookie walk and bake tables were also set-up.

What is a cookie walk? Well, there are trays of home-made cookies of every kind and as a person walks along the table

Susan Robertson, the Auxiliary President, welcomed the guests who came to support the Tea.

"It is a time to celebrate the successes of the previous year, a time to recognize the stellar fundraising efforts of our members, and last, but by no means least, a time to feel our collective pride as we make our donation to the Hospital".

Robertson then provided a brief outline of how the hospital determines the priority needs of equipment each year through their capital planning process. Once the list is complete, the Auxiliary receives the list to select which items

"Sometimes we contribute to a major corporate fundraising goal as we did in 2012 when we pledged sixty thousand dollars toward the digital mammography equipment",

noted Robertson, adding that the amount was selected to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the Auxiliary.

That pledge was paid in full by 2013 as well as an additional fifteen thousand dollars toward medical equipment.

"Last year, we were able to purchase 5 new state-of-the-art Stryker beds and mattresses at a cost of about forty-five thousand dollars", she added.

The Auxiliary's recent commitment to La Verendrye Hospital is for the purchase of mechanical ventilator for the Intensive Care Unit at a cost of fifty thousand dollars.

"It is with great pleasure that I invite Livia Lundon, Chair of Riverside Foundation for Health Care, and Samantha Manty, Foundation Director, to step forward and accept this donation of forty thousand dollars towards this purchase", said Robertson as the crowd applauded.

Lundon extended appreciation to the membership on behalf of the Foundation. "Thank you to all the volunteers for your continued commitment to health care".

Robertson then acknowledged Mary Jane Pearson for her efforts in organizing the Tea and to the many volunteers who came to help.

"Thanks for coming", said Pearson as the crowd showed their appreciation. "It does my heart good".

The weather certainly has improved for many of the fall jobs farmers are trying to complete. At EARS we finally finished combining. The soybeans were the lowest yields I have ever seen at EARS and the seed was small and varied in size. It was also still quite soft so we immediately put in our drying oven.

We won't tackle cleaning them until all our cereal trials are complete. We hope to do some corn yields this week. We are just going to treat all varieties as silage since we have heavy bird damage and our late seeding so there will be no grain yields. We will have to re-think how we do corn research next year or maybe just consider doing some on-farm trials instead of having plots destroyed by our many pests. I still have to tackle the ploughing and I'm thinking it is going to be a

pretty cold job this year – good think I have lots of clothes!

It was a busy weekend at home as well. Calves were all vaccinated and moved out of the corral. We put up some new electric fence to teach both the bull and horse a lesson and that worked very fast. We brought all the cows' home on Saturday so we could preg check on Sunday. I was pleasantly surprised on how well the cows cooperated and came home. I wasn't so happy with preg checking though. I was pretty sure that I had some open cows but I was also hoping that I was wrong. I wasn't. So I have 6 cows that are going to have to go and the bull! The worst part is 4 of them are by far my best cows. I have found this particular bull to be very lazy but haven't had troubles the last 2 years, but this year it proved true. He is a great bull, nice calves and great disposition but this is very unacceptable. I guess it could have been worse but it

sure could have been better. Funny how things work like this -cattle prices are high and you end up with troubles. I am hoping that I can find some bred heifers now – but with high market prices it is the most expensive time to be shopping! These are the "joys" of farming!

It is a Cattle Sale week once again! The Sale this Saturday the 25th is our last Sale of the year. Start time is set for 9:00 a.m. It is looking like James has been able to round up a bunch of great cattle once again. We will also have some bred cattle at this sale. If you are just interested in watching a cattle auction we encourage you to visit our barn. Everyone is welcome. We are one of the few Auction Barns that are community owned and we are quite proud of it.
